ost singles would find a four-room HDB apartment adequate, but not homeowner T.C. "I have a lot of stuff," chuckles the bachelor. So when he engaged designer Gary Boo of Arte Living to do up his flat, he requested to incorporate plenty of storage.

T.C.'s other requirement was that the interior not be "too bold". He explains: "I might eventually want to rent out or sell the flat, so the design has to be generic enough for someone else to like it." With that in mind, the forward-thinking homeowner and his designer decided on a white, minimalist interior. "I can bring in my personality with my collection of decorative items, but when you remove the things, the space becomes a blank canvas," reasons T.C.

## SPACE PLANNING

The 30-year-old property needed a complete overhaul to transform it into a clean-cut, modern abode. The original built-in furnishings were tom down, the walls plastered and whitewashed, and the electrical wiring updated and concealed.

To create a more efficient space, Gary knocked down the walls of one of the three bedrooms to convert it into a dining-cum-study area that flows into the new open-concept kitchen. As T.C. hardly cooks, Gary shrunk the latter to expand the back toilet and utility area. The compact kitchen now fits in an induction hob, sink and white floor-to-ceiling cabinets in a row. A solid-surface island counter with storage below also functions as a six-seater dining table and work desk. >



With a larger back area, the formerly crammed bathroom is now a more luxurious space – a welcome element since the master bedrooms of older HDB flats like this one do not have ensuite bathrooms. There is a sleek black marble sink, glass vanity and even room for an extra built-in wardrobe, which T.C. no doubt finds more useful than a larger kitchen.

More storage is discreetly incorporated throughout. A flushed white niche in the utility area conceals the rubbish chute, broom and other cleaning equipment. In the living room, a full-height mirrored column cabinet stores shoes, while a built-in sideboard by the main door hides knick-knacks. The panels on a TV slide open to reveal cabinets and display shelves.

## THE LITTLE TOUCHES

Against the white backdrop, Gary incorporated subtle accents with an urbane edge. The master bedroom's door is made from cement-coated plywood embedded with Swarovski crystals, and a feature wall in the room is clad in a wall covering that has the texture of stingray skin.

T.C.'s collection of contemporary art, fleamarket finds and travel buys also add colour. The renovation, including electrical works, cost \$65,000 – a worthwhile investment, feels T.C. Not only does his new home suit his needs, it can also easily adapt to someone else's if need be. •
